WHAT SYSTEMS DO YOU HAVE IN PLACE TO IDENTIFY AND SUPPORT THESE STUDENTS?

Each year, one out of every seven children will run away from home before they turn 18 years of age, resulting in about 1.6 million runaway and homeless children and youth living on the streets nationally. Some reasons children run away include, but are not limited to, abuse/violence in the family, separation or divorce of parents, death or birth of a new baby in the family, alcohol or substance abuse, shame-based behaviors, or one explosive argument at home. When these children remain on their own and out on the streets for more than two weeks, there is an increased likelihood of substance abuse, early parenthood, depression, posttraumatic stress disorder, and the risk of being trafficked. (See the article on *Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children*.) What we need to remember is that these children are not "bad kids" but are usually good kids caught in a bad situation.

Although November is almost over, the issue will continue to exist. Schools can serve as a safe haven for these children and youth. Schools are where they can find stability and routine, consistent faces, shelter from the elements, and meals, among other forms of support. It begins with proper and immediate identification of these students, and providing them the resources available at school and in the community so that they do not resort to behaviors that put them at risk. Perhaps, it is designating a point-person at each school site to serve as an extension of the local educational agency's liaison for homeless education so that students can receive timely assistance and referrals to needed services. The posting of the educational rights and protections afforded to homeless children and youth, pursuant to Education Code section 48852.5, not only reaches those students who may not have initially wanted to share their situation with anyone else, but the information also serves as a reminder to staff of their duties and responsibilities. It is critical that staff are trained on and reminded of how to better address the barriers and challenges of these students to ensure positive educational outcomes.

COMMERCIAL SEXUAL EXPLOITATION OF CHILDREN

Commercial sexual exploitation of children (CSEC) is a \$32 billion dollar global industry that includes sex trafficking, child pornography, and child sex tourism. It is considered to be one of the fastest growing criminal industries in the world because unlike drugs and weapons, humans are a renewable resource to be sold and resold several times over. No community is immune as a direct result of technology, which has given predators anonymity and widespread access to children. However, California has been found to be a magnet for sex trafficking of children, and schools are being used as recruiting grounds.

Below is information that should be shared with staff, particularly those who serve on student success teams (SST), school attendance review teams/boards (SART/SARB), and other assessment teams.



COMMON TARGETS

Children and youth 11-14 years of age who:

- Have been pushed out or have run away from home
- Are homeless
- In foster care or have been involved in the child welfare system
- Are pregnant
- Are active on social media or participate in massively multiplayer online roleplaying games (MMORPG)

ASSESSMENT QUESTIONS

- Control of his/her ID documents? If not, who is?
- Movement or communication restricted or monitored?
- Afraid to speak about himself/herself in the presence of others?
- Aware of his/her location (city & state)?
- A minor engaged in commercial sex?
- Evidence of physical or sexual assault
- Doing a job he/she was recruited for or something different?
- Salary being confiscated to pay off a debt to the employer?
- Held against his/her will?
- Family threatened with harm if he/she attempts to escape or report the abuse?
